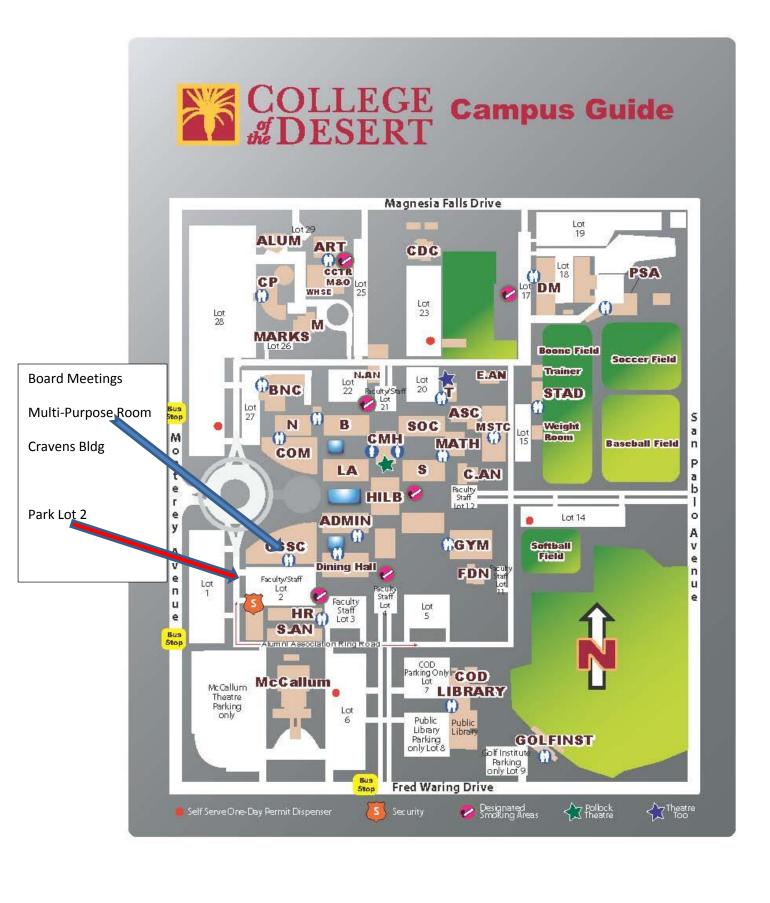

Dear Board Members,

At the last Board meeting, I forwarded a proposed policy on participation of the COD Foundation in requests for Sponsorships, purchase of Tables, and purchase of Tribute ads for other community organizations. As you all know, the Desert calendar is full of events supporting nonprofit organizations. These request come in monthly to our office. While I agree that we need to have a community presence, and play a role in the development and support of community organizations, I believe that the Board should develop a policy to address these requests. For that reason, I reviewed the minutes of the past Board discussions and attempted to do a DRAFT of a policy for your consideration and adoption.

At the Board meeting, I would request that the Board discuss the proposed policy and offer guidance to formulating a policy and ultimately adopt a policy on this matter:

Here are some key considerations:

- As we have a fiduciary responsibility to our donors, is it prudent to use donor dollars for the purchasing of Sponsorships, Tables and Tribute Ads?
- How is it determined which ones are selected? What is the criteria?
- What is the criteria? That other organizations have donated to COD? That a particular individual is being honored? That the organization has a direct link to COD in providing educational opportunities?
- Should we forward all requests to the Board and have the Board select which ones are approved or not? Should it be determined by the Executive Committee? I do not think these decisions should be made by staff.
- How much should we allocate and budget each year for Sponsorships, purchase of tables and tribute ads?
- If we purchase a table, who should attend to represent the College? How many should be in attendance?

As there are over 1,000 non-profit organizations in the Valley (all doing great work), and they all seem to be doing events, galas, lunches, and requests for donations, I do believe a policy is in order for the COD Foundation.

Thank you for your assistance in this matter.

Introduction:

The Mission statement, Vision statement, Bylaws and the Master Agreement all reference the responsibility of the Foundation to be an active participant in the activities of the community. The expressions, "resource development", "community service" and "community outreach," are mentioned prominently in these founding documents. Building community relationships is an important charge to the Foundation. To be useful these relationships must complement and support the mission of the Foundation.

It is especially important that relationships with other charitable organizations have goals which fall within our own established parameters. It must never appear to our donors that funds intended for the College are being rerouted to another charity whose focus of activity does not in some way impact the College of the Desert. Foundation donations, gifts, dinner tables and such events to honor activities or individuals are a worthwhile activity of the Foundation so long as there is a guaranteed or historical reciprocity from the other charity. It is also important to make known that/when Foundation expenses are underwritten by private gifts rather than Foundation resources. When the Foundation is approached for a gift or a table of reservations, it would be in order to offer this as a giving/funding opportunity for a member or group of members to either attend or designate a Foundation representative.

<u>Procedure for Sponsorships and Purchase of Tables for Charity Events:</u>

The College of the Desert Foundation will establish a budget line item for supporting our Community Outreach. Reciprocity and past support of our events will weigh in on the decision making for all requests for Sponsorships and purchasing of tables. All invitations made of the Foundation to support another organization's event should be brought to Board meetings for discussion &/or emailed. Events where sponsorships & tables are over \$2000 the invitation will be emailed to the Executive Committee for decision. Any event where sponsorships & tables are under \$2,000 the decision will be up to the Executive Director in consultation with the President of the Foundation.

Procedure for Tribute Ads for Charity Events:

Tribute Ads in Charity event programs up to \$500 may be purchased by the College of the Desert Foundation as determined by the Executive Committee. Requests for participation in program ads will be distributed to the Foundation President and the Executive committee upon receipt at the Foundation office.
